

## CHANDLER, Joseph

### Supplier of subsistence



Eleven documents are found in a file for Joseph Chandler in the National Archives files for Citizens. Chandler's signature shows significant variation, but stylistically it is a good match to the endorsement on the Treasury note.

On December 5<sup>th</sup>, 1862, Joseph Chandler received \$2,600.00 at Abingdon, Virginia, from Maj. W. A. Bradford, ACS, for 100 barrels of flour and 1,500 pounds of bacon.

On August 5<sup>th</sup>, 1863, Chandler received \$179.52 at Knox County (Tennessee?), for 8,160 pounds of sheaf oats.

On July 30<sup>th</sup>, 1864, Chandler received \$27.00 for 500 pounds of fodder, and on August 23<sup>rd</sup>, 1864, he received \$57.72 for 610 pounds of corn, all at Sumter County, South Carolina.

McNeil

In the spirit of building the Wall of Knowledge one brick higher, Joseph Chandler is listed in the 1860 Federal Census for Sumter, South Carolina, as a farmer. He was born on March 5<sup>th</sup>, 1827 and passed away on August 19<sup>th</sup>, 1876. He owned 18 slaves according to the 1860 Slave Schedule that was part of the census.
